When I get to the hospital, we will take an elevator to the third floor.






Someone will bring us to my hospital room.




I will get a bracelet with my name and birthday on it.

I can wear my own comfy clothes from home or wear hospital pajamas.






There are lots of friendly people to help get me ready for my cleanout. Someone will check my temperature with a wand that touches my forehead.



To check my heart, lungs, and belly, they will use a stethoscope. They will ask me to take deep breaths.








They will also check my blood pressure using a sleeve that gives my arm a hug.







I might get medicine to help my body get ready for my cleanout. I may drink medicine through a medicine tube or a cup.






My body will get more medicine through a little bendy medicine straw called an IV.







To get ready for my IV, someone will look at my arm to find the right spot for the straw.



They will use a rubber band to give my arm a squeeze. Then, they will use a sponge to clean my arm.



There will be a quick poke to get the straw in the right place. The poke will come out and the straw will stay to give my body medicine.



A sticker will help the medicine straw stay in the right place. Medicine tubes will attach to the medicine straw like legos to give my body medicine. Another tube will give medicine right to my belly. This tube is called an NG tube. My NG tube will go in my nose and down to my belly.

Once the tube is in the right place, they will place a sticker on my cheek to help keep it still.



My body might also need medicine that goes in my bum.









All this medicine will make my body poop. I will have a special potty close to my bed and my own bathroom.
